PRESIDENT SAYS

Interview with Sydell Carlton, President of IAEA

First of all, this is the fourth day of the conference. We would like to know your opinion. Have the conference met your expectations?

Absolutely. The conference met my expectations and even more so far. It has been excellent. The papers, the content, the social events, and the hospitality have been wonderful.

To what extent do you think conferences of IAEA can contribute for closing education gap between developed and developing countries?

I think for the developing countries coming here is very important. They learn how the developed nations are doing things, they also get positive enforcement of what they are doing. They can come here, deliver papers, get feedback. I think it is very useful for closing the gap. In fact in assessment I'm not sure that there is a great gap in the world, because of the conferences like this.

Do you think that such specialized conferences like ours must be accompanied by others addressing different aspects of education sphere?

Yes I think so, because, although it is an important part, it is just a part. I think it would be nice to have conferences on teacher quality, on educational standards, on the conduct of education as a whole. What assessment is giving results on all these things, and it also gives you information to the way education is conductive right. I think it would be nice to have complementary conferences on related subjects.

Can we consider our conferences within the context of faculty club culture originated in western countries and so widely spread in the world, where intellectuals associate and spread values and ideas to bring world together?

We are spreading techniques, we are spreading expertise. We are not spreading directly values. But I think the fact that different kinds of people can come together, can be in session together and can share any sense, and making people aware that things are not so different from place to place indirectly is spreading values.
